## IDEAS FOR PARTICIPATION

Order as many of the books as possible early in the year. Order multiple copies so that at least one copy of each title can be put on reserve for librarians and/or teachers.

All nominated books on the list do not have to be shared with children. Some titles may not fit with your library's selection policy. Students only need to read **five** books to be eligible to vote. Share as many titles as possible. Suggestions for possible activities follow.

Have a party or reception for the children and/or teachers to come and "meet the candidates." Have a schedule or calendar ready for them to sign up for their use. Be sure to communicate which titles you intend to use in your story times and/or lessons.

Make book bags or boxes for each book that might include activities for home or school, discussion questions, or hands-on items that would be appropriate to supplement the story. Promote these activity bags to teachers, parents, homeschoolers, and private schools.

Plan a unit on voting or elections and extend the unit into activities around the book nominations. Include campaign managers, speeches, slogans, posters, banners, parades, etc. culminating in an election in which an actual voting booth is used. Sponsor a contest for best banner or poster.

Have a special reading week before the voting when you ask other staff members in the school to help read the books to children--include secretaries, custodians, bus drivers, assistant principals, supervisors, local celebrities, and parents. Videotape and broadcast.

Make a "Reading Rainbow" type video with the students writing and performing the book reviews. Broadcast on school news shows.

Create an award for the winning book in your school. Create a certificate and send it to the winning author along with notes and pictures from the students.

For voting, display the books in the order they are listed on the voting ballot. Borrow official voting machines from your local Board of Elections or investigate voting electronically or in a spreadsheet computer program. Place grocery bags in front of each book and have children drop beans or paper slips into one bag to cast their vote. Use the bookmarks in the activity booklet to register the titles they have read and then circle their choice for winner.

Use the NCCBA Book List as Honor Club books for parents and students to purchase for the Media Center. Have them on display at the school's first Open House.

Remember to introduce other new books to nominate for next year's award. Please include: Category (Picture or Junior), Title, Author, Publisher, and Publication Date.

## TIMELINE FOR PARTICIPATING IN THE NCCBA PROGRAM

July-August	Order books. Register your library at ( <a href="http://www.cmlibrary.org/bookhive/NCCBA/">http://www.cmlibrary.org/bookhive/NCCBA/</a> ) Prepare story times and lesson plans.
July-March	Read books and share with children. Implement various activities. Introduce the program to teachers and librarians. Encourage teachers to read books aloud to children. Promote the NCCBA Program at meetings, classes, programs, etc. Introduce other new books that fit the criteria for the next year's program. Have students nominate books published after 2009.
Sept.-Oct.	Attend NCSLMA conferences to see winning authors and attend book talk sessions.
November 1	Begin sending nominations to Bookhive web site or by email.
January	Make final plans for voting activities.
February	Finish sharing books. Send nominations for next year's consideration list.
March	Review Books <b>Vote</b> and send in totals for EACH title by <b>March 31</b> .
March 31	Last day to nominate books for next year's consideration list. Send nominations to Bookhive web site or by email.

## NCCBA 2012 PICTURE BOOK NOMINATIONS

**Barton, Chris. *Shark vs. Train*. NY: Little, Brown. 2010.**

A shark and a train compete in a series of contests on a seesaw, in hot air balloons, bowling, shooting baskets, playing hide-and-seek, and more, as two boys play.

**Brennan-Nelson, Denise. *Willow*. Chelsea, MI: Sleeping Bear Press. 2008.**

In art class, neatness, conformity, and imitation are encouraged, but when Willow brings imagination and creativity to her projects, even straight-laced Miss Hawthorn is influenced.

**Donaldson, Julia. *What the Ladybug Heard*. NY: Henry Holt & Company. 2009**

Although much quieter than the farm animals that moo, cluck, or oink, a gentle ladybug is instrumental in foiling a plan to steal the farm's prize-winning cow.

**Hill, Laban Carrick. *Dave the Potter: Artist, Poet, Slave*. New York: Little, Brown. 2010.**

Chronicles the life of Dave, a nineteenth-century slave who went on to become an influential poet, artist, and potter.

**MacLachlan, Patricia. *I Didn't Do It*. New York : Katherine Tegen Books. 2010.**

In a series of poems, excited puppies relate such new discoveries as the mailman comes every day and food tastes better eaten off a human's plate.

**Perry, John. *The Book that Eats People*. Berkeley: Tricycle Press. 2009**

The reader is warned to be careful around this book, which has already eaten several people and is always hungry.

**Ramsey, Calvin. *Ruth and the Green Book*. Minneapolis, MN: Carolrhoda Books. 2010.**

When Ruth and her parents take a motor trip from Chicago to Alabama to visit her grandma, they rely on a pamphlet called "The Negro Motorist Green Book" to find places that will serve them. Includes facts about "The Green Book."

**Rosenthal, Amy Krouse. *Spoon*. New York: Disney/Hyperion Books. 2009.**

Spoon's always been a happy little utensil. But lately, he feels like life as a spoon just isn't cutting it. He thinks Fork, Knife, and The Chopsticks all have it so much better than him. But do they? And what do they think about Spoon?

**Sattler, Jennifer Gordon. *Sylvie*. New York: Random House Children's Books**

When Sylvie the pink flamingo learns her color comes from the little pink shrimp she eats, she decides to expand her choices, trying everything under the sun and, unfortunately, overdoing it.

**Sauer, Tammi. *Mr. Duck Means Business*. NY: Simon & Schuster Books for Young Readers. 2011.**

Mr. Duck enjoys a quiet morning routine on his private pond every day until other animals mistakenly think he has invited them to join him.

**Stein, David Ezra. *Interrupting Chicken*. Somerville, MA: Candlewick Press. 2010.**

Little Red Chicken wants Papa to read her a bedtime story, but interrupts him almost as soon as he begins each tale.

**Willems, Mo. *City Dog, Country Frog*. New York: Hyperion Books for Children. 2010.**

Through the seasons, whenever City Dog visits the country he runs straight for Country Frog's rock to play games with him, but during the winter things change for them both.

NORTH CAROLINA CHILDREN'S BOOK AWARD  
**PICTURE BOOK GUIDELINES**  
(appropriate for Kindergarten through grade 3)

Sponsored by the North Carolina School Library Media Association and the Youth Services Section of the North Carolina Library Association.

**Purpose:**

- \* To encourage lower elementary students to become better acquainted with the best writers and illustrators of contemporary books with outstanding literary appeal;
- \* To broaden students' awareness of literature as a means of personal satisfaction and lifelong pursuit;
- \* To promote reading aloud with students in the early grades as a means of introducing reading as a pleasure;
- \* To give recognition and honor to their favorite books, authors, and illustrators.

**Voting Procedures and Rules:**

- \* **Register** your library at <http://www.cmlibrary.org/bookhive/NCCBA/>.
- \* Elementary school children will vote during the month of March 2012 from the list of nominated books.
- \* To be eligible to vote, children must be exposed to at least five of the titles by either reading them in their entirety independently, or by having them read aloud.
- \* Each qualified voter has one vote for his/her favorite book and may participate through the public library **and/or** school library/classroom.
- \* **Total votes for each title** should be tabulated and sent to the Book Award Committee (Lisa England or Jane Deacle) by March 31, 2012.
- \* Votes may be sent by snail mail, fax, email or online at Bookhive (<http://www.cmlibrary.org/bookhive/NCCBA/>).
- \* **Send vote tallies for ALL TITLES.** Systems may send group totals from several libraries if individual libraries are not sending vote totals online.

**Nominations Procedure for the 2012 Award:**

- \* Grade school children may make suggestions during the school year.
- \* Suggestions for titles to be nominated for the 2012 award may be sent from November 1, 2011 – March 31, 2012.
- \* **DEADLINE for nominations is MARCH 31, 2012.** See form for nominating titles in activity booklet.

A committee representing NCSLMA, NCLA YS Committee will choose 10 to 15 titles from the list of suggestions submitted by the children to be on the 2012 Children's Picture Book Award nominees.

**Eligibility for the 2012 Award:**

- \* The nominated book must be recognized as a noteworthy picture book, fiction, or nonfiction, appropriate for grades K-3.
- \* The nominated book must have a copyright date of 2009 or later.

## NCCBA 2012 JUNIOR BOOK NOMINATIONS

**Angleberger, Tom. *The Strange Case of Origami Yoda*. NY: Amulet Books. 2010.**

Sixth-grader Tommy and his friends describe their interactions with a paper finger puppet of Yoda, worn by their weird classmate Dwight, as they try to figure out whether or not the puppet can really predict the future. Includes instructions for making Origami Yoda.

**Appelt, Kathi. *Keeper*. New York : Atheneum Books for Young Readers. 2010.**

On the night of the blue moon when mermaids are said to gather on a sandbar in the Gulf of Mexico, ten-year-old Keeper sets out in a small boat, with her dog BD and a seagull named Captain, determined to find her mother, a mermaid, as Keeper has always believed, who left long ago to return to the sea.

**Bemis, John Claude. *The Nine Pound Hammer*. NY: Random House. 2009.**

Drawn by the lodestone his father gave him years before, twelve-year-old orphan Ray travels south, meeting along the way various characters from folklore who are battling against an evil industry baron known as the Gog.

**Gidwitz, Adam. *A Tale Dark and Grimm*. New York : Dutton Children's Books. 2010.**

Follows Hansel and Gretel as they walk out of their own story and into eight more tales, encountering such wicked creatures as witches, along with kindly strangers and other helpful folk. Based in part on the Grimms' fairy tales Faithful Johannes, Hansel and Gretel, The seven ravens, Brother and sister, The robber bridegroom, and The devil and his three golden hairs.

**Kehret, Peg. *Runaway Twin*. NY: Dutton Children's Books. 2009**

Thirteen-year-old Sunny, accompanied by a stray dog, takes advantage of a windfall to travel from her Nebraska foster home to Enumclaw, Washington, to find the twin sister from whom she was separated at age three.

**Law, Ingrid. *Scumble*. New York : Dial Books for Young Readers. 2010.**

Mibs's cousin Ledge is disappointed to discover that his "savvy"--the magical power unique to each member of their family--is to make things fall apart, which endangers his uncle Autry's ranch and reveals the family secret to future reporter Sarah.

**Lord, Cynthia. *Touch Blue*. NY: Scholastic Press. 2010.**

When the state of Maine threatens to shut down their island's one-room schoolhouse because of dwindling enrollment, eleven-year-old Tess, a strong believer in luck, and her family take in a trumpet-playing foster child to increase the school's population.

**Scieszka, Jon. *Spaceheadz*. NY: Simon & Schuster Books for Young Readers. 2010.**

On his first day at Brooklyn's P.S. 858, fifth-grader Michael K. is teamed with two very strange students, and while he gradually comes to believe they are aliens who need his help, he has trouble convincing anyone else of the truth.

**Singer, Marilyn. *Mirror mirror : a book of reversible verse*. NY: Dutton Children's Books. 2010**

A collection of short poems which, when reversed, provide new perspectives on the fairy tale characters they feature.

**Van Cleve, Kathleen. *Drizzle*. NY: Dial Books for Young Readers. 2010.**

When a drought threatens her family's magical rhubarb farm, eleven-year-old Polly tries to find a way to make it rain again.

**Vanderpool, Clare. *Moon Over Manifest*. New York : Delacorte Press. 2010.**

Twelve-year-old Abilene Tucker is the daughter of a drifter who, in the summer of 1936, sends her to stay with an old friend in Manifest, Kansas, where he grew up, and where she hopes to find out some things about his past.

**Wiles, Deborah. *Countdown*. New York : Scholastic. 2010.**

Franny Chapman just wants some peace. But that's hard to get when her best friend is feuding with her, her sister has disappeared, and her uncle is fighting an old war in his head. Her saintly younger brother is no help, and the cute boy across the street only complicates things. Worst of all, everyone is walking around just waiting for a bomb to fall...

**JUNIOR BOOK GUIDELINES**  
(appropriate for 4th through 6th grades)

Sponsored by the North Carolina School Library Media Association and the Youth Services Section of the North Carolina Library Association.

**Purpose:**

- \* To encourage students in grades 4 through 6 to become better acquainted with noteworthy writers of contemporary books;
- \* To broaden students’ awareness of literature as a means of personal satisfaction and lifelong pursuits;
- \* To promote reading aloud with students as a means of extending the concept of reading for pleasure;
- \* To give recognition and honor to their favorite books, authors, and illustrators.

**Voting Procedures and Rules:**

- \* Register your library at [www.bookhive.org/nccba](http://www.bookhive.org/nccba).
- \* Students vote during the month of March 2012 from the list of nominated books.
- \* To be eligible to vote, children must be exposed to at least five of the titles by either reading them in their entirety themselves, or having them read to them in their entirety or a combination of the two.
- \* Each qualified voter has one vote for his/her favorite book and may participate through the public library **and/or** school library/classroom.
- \* **Total votes for each title** should be tabulated and sent to the Book Award Committee Chairs (Lisa England or Jane Deacle) by March 31, 2012.
- \* Votes may be sent by snail mail, fax, e-mail or online at Bookhive (<http://www.cmlibrary.org/bookhive/NCCBA/>).
- \* **Send vote tallies for ALL TITLES.** Systems may send group totals from several libraries if individual libraries are not sending vote totals online.

**Nominations Procedure for the 2012 Award:**

- \* Children may make suggestions any time during the school year. See form for nominating titles in activity booklet.
- \* Suggestions for titles to be nominated for the 2012 award may be sent from November 1, 2011 – March 31, 2012.
- \* **All nominations are due March 31, 2012.**

A committee representing NCSLMA, and NCLA YS Committee will choose approximately 10 to 15 titles from the list of suggestions submitted by the children to be the 2012 Junior Book award nominees.

**Eligibility for the 2012 Award:**

- \* The nominated book must be recognized as a noteworthy Junior book, fiction or nonfiction, appropriate for grades 4-6.
- \* The nominated book must have a copyright date of 2009 or later.
